The curriculum is developed and decided by the university giving due consideration to the curriculum provided by NCTE. The curriculum Development Committee of college obtains suggestions from the Alumniees, senior academicians, guardians, and management of the college, considers them and forwards them to the University for Consideration by the Board of Studies and Academic Council. Global Trends in teacher education are reflected by inclusion of various topics of global importance like Environmental Education, Information and Communication Technology and Value Education. The educational programme has a thrust on national issues like Women Empowerment, Human Rights, Secularism, National Integration etc. It also bears thrust on Common Cultural Heritage, Democracy, Neatness. The college uses ICT in curriculum planning, power point presentation is done by faculty in class room teaching and by trainees in practice teaching ICT is used in examinations, accounts, notices,

agenda, minutes also. CD's of micro teaching skills are available to students.

The student teachers are advised to select different methods of teaching because the levels of students differ. The college organizes various workshops, seminars, where the teacher trainees have to remain present. Various learning experience are provided through cultural activities, youth where students get informal education in planning. Students also participate in extension programme. Various days like Teachers Day, Hindi Diwas are organized. Feedback is taken on curriculum from alumni, academic peers, parents and management. Suggestion boxes are put in the college.
